Progress has made in all areas, the Achievement for All programme ensures that groups of pupils are identified, the appropriate intervention is put in place and that the impact is monitored. Once again, all pupils left with 5+ GCSEs including English and maths A\*-G grades. All departments have reviewed how they feedback to pupils, this includes a range of assessment for learning approaches. Pupils show the most progress when they know where they are, where they need to be and how they are going to get there. Pupils have been encouraged to be more independent and proactive in target setting. This included target setting against the national priorities of improving literacy and numeracy. The school has worked with 14 employers over the year to identify and implement an employability skills programme. Certain subjects have incorporated the hard skills of communication, number and ICT into their programmes of study and a programme for developing resilience, initiative and enterprise has been developed. The new WBQ course ensures that employability skills are developed. A new continuous professional development programme has been introduced, all staff set performance management objectives that support the school and development improvement priorities and are linked to the professional teaching and leadership standards. A majority of staff have worked together to enhance their lesson planning and delivery.

The school prospectus has been updated in response to the new Education Measures and this year includes a celebration section on succeeding together.

The Argoed High School fully adheres to Flintshire County Council's Admission Policy.

Transition activities are conducted to ensure a smooth and informed transition between key stages two and three. The Argoed High School is a member of the Local Consortium group and has a planned transition programme every year.

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## School Buildings and Premises

During the academic year 2014-15 the following maintenance items have been addressed:

All toilet facilities are regularly checked and open throughout the day – Cleaners are employed at the school and clean both pupil and staff toilets daily. ### **Changes to the school prospectus,**

One change s has been made to the school prospectus, which was an update on the schools exam performance.

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## The Curriculum - What subjects do our pupils study?

**In Years 7, 8 and 9** Mathematics, English, Science, French, Welsh, German, History, Geography, Art, Music, Drama, Design & Technology, Physical Education, Religious Education, ICT and PSE. A skills based lesson with year 7 focusing on literacy, year 8 numeracy and year 9 communication and ICT.

**Assessment KS3** All pupils are Teacher Assessed and evidenced against National Curriculum levels using WG guidelines. Results are reported to parents at the end of year 9. We ensure that pupils are regularly assessed against National Curriculum levels and effective feedback is given regularly so that pupils know what to do to make progress.

**In Years 10 and 11** The 2014-15 curriculum continued with the open options system for pupils providing a balance of academic and vocational courses in line with the Learning and Skills Measure. Through collaboration with other schools additional courses of Public Services, iMedia, Mandarin were offered to our students.

**Assessment KS4** All pupils were entered for examinations.

### Welsh

As an English medium school, Welsh is taught as a second language here at Argoed High School. However, we place great emphasis on the importance of bilingualism and living and working in a bilingual country.

### Sex Education

In line with Government regulations the Governors continue to implement the School's Sex Education Policy, in consultation with representatives from parents and staff. Parents have the right to withdraw their children from some aspects of sex education if they wish.

### Careers Education

To improve its effectiveness this is being delivered mainly during the pastoral period by Learning Mentors with additional input from the Careers Service and Industry where appropriate. Our 14-19 pupils use Careers Wales Online to support them with their option choices and post 16 progression.

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## How do we make provision for pupils with Additional Learning Needs (ALN)?

Number of pupils with full Statements in September 2015 = 42

### What are the main principles of the Governors' Policy for pupils with Additional Learning Needs?

- To provide effective learning in a happy, sensitive and secure environment.
- To ensure maximum participation by parents and carers and close involvement by relevant professionals.
- To utilise teaching strategies which are responsive to different learning styles and which ensure effective learning.
- To encourage involvement of the whole school in the management of pupils with additional learning needs.
- To provide thoughtful assessment and testing used to the benefit of the learner.
- To make provision for disabled pupils where possible and ensure that they have full access to the curriculum.

### How is this policy put into practice?

- A register of pupils with additional needs is drawn up.
- Individual Education Plans are compiled for each student on the register at School Action.
- All school departments have clear policies and subject plans for the management of additional learning needs.
- Parents will be informed/involved when their children are thought to have additional needs.
- Statements will be reviewed annually and regular reviews of progress held for all pupils on the register.
- Professional bodies such as the Education Psychology Service and Speech Therapists will be actively involved in supporting pupils with additional learning needs.
- Full time classroom support is provided for a small group of pupils who have specific language disorders and/or Asperger Syndrome.

### How do the Governors monitor the implementation of this policy?

Mrs. Nikki Pearce, the ALN Governor meets regularly with the schools ALNCO and reports back to the Governing Body. The ALNCO also meets regularly with SLT.

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## More Able and Talented

At Argoed High School we believe in providing an inclusive learning community that will promote stimulating and challenging experiences for all pupils. Ability and talent can manifest itself in many ways for example, academic, practical and physical. As part of the Flintshire 14-19 Network, we have been able to offer more able and talented pupils a variety of activities which celebrates the individuality of each pupil. These events were organised and funded by the 14-19 Flintshire Network.

Pupils had the opportunity to participate in a variety of activities including maths and science based problem solving days; creative and performance workshops and humanities based activities. These activities enable the more able and talented pupil to experience an extension to the learning which takes place within the classroom.

## Bilingualism

Our aim is to promote and foster bilingualism in order to create as many opportunities as possible for learners to participate and to achieve bilingually within our learning environment and linguistic context. Our first language is primarily English and we are fortunate to have a number of bilingual staff who provide excellent role models for our pupils. Curriculum Cymreig is an important and integral part of the schemes of work for all subject areas and the Welsh Baccalaureate provides excellent opportunities to study and further expand our pupils' knowledge and understanding of Wales. The school Eisteddfod remains one of the key events of the school year and KS3 with support in some areas from KS4 pupils produce a great event, one which pupils and staff should be extremely proud of.

Welsh full course remains a very popular option for our KS4 pupils and has excellent outcomes.

## Attendance

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## Physical Education Report to Governors

### Urdd Gymnastics

2015 – Gymnastics became our most attended club with 20-30 pupils attending all 3 sessions every week. We competed in the Urdd gymnastics competition with our largest team every (37). this was also the largest team from any other school. Our ks4 trio, male solo and group made it to the final in Aberystwyth where all competition and placed second over all in Wales.

This was a great achievement as the only team ahead of us were a club level acro team.

### Athletics

We attended and competed in every athletics meet this year. in each meet at least 1 pupil from each year group was selected to go on and represent Flintshire.

### Cross Country

After the cross country races in Mold Alun, a number of our pupils were selected to go on and represent North east Wales at the intercounty meet. A special mention should be made to James Jones who has been selected as a long distance runner for Wales.

### Rounders

This summer our year 7-10 teams all finished in the top 3 for the Rounders County Competition.

### Football

All teams entered the Flintshire competition with our Year 10's making the semi-finals.

### Rugby

Rugby is the highest participated boys club in the school with a huge increase in numbers. This year we have a team in every key stage 3 year group, a year 10 team and a Key Stage 4 mixed team. Year 7 and 8 have entered a North Wales rugby competition which is due to start in January.

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## How does the Governing Body promote links with the Community?

- Youth** The school premises are in use from Monday to Friday outside of school hours. They provide accommodation for Rainbows, Brownies, Rangers and a wide range of extra curricular activities have taken place.
- The Sports Hall facility continues to be hired to the community, subject to terms and conditions as agreed by Governors.
- The school football pitches and AWP are used at evenings and weekends by local football clubs. A very popular football tournament is held at the school. A number of County Youth events also take place at Argoed.
- Adult** A Craft Club takes place each Friday morning.
- Parents** The Home School Association has struggled to attract membership this year but has still continued to support the school at events such as the Strawberry Prom and Christmas Fayre. Fund raising events this year have included an Autumn Fair. Parents are kept regularly informed of events through the weekly school newsletter. Parents information evenings are regularly held including options, Year 7 and Year 10 information evenings.
- Police Liaison** Regular weekly contact has been maintained with the School Beat Officer. Many other members of the community representing charities, the Church and health related organisations are regular visitors to the school where they contribute to the pastoral programme.
- Industry** Work experience for Year 10 brings the school into contact with many local shops and industries. Year 10 and 11 pupils participate in the Young Enterprise Scheme which is organised by representatives from local firms. We have also visited local companies to enrich the curriculum and have run joint projects in Science, Maths and WBQ.
- Community Liaison** The Headteacher represents the school at a number of local meetings where issues concerning the local community are discussed. Pupils have also represented the school within the community in a variety of events.
- Charities** The school raises monies for various charities, local and national. This has been greatly enhanced this year by the varied and excellent work undertaken by our volunteers completing the WBQ and the charities supported by our Houses.
